Licensure

Facility must: Hold a CLIA Certificate of Waiver or higher.

Additionally, POC lead analyzer laboratories must:

- Maintain documentation of instrument calibration and quality control testing;
- Record date that blood lead test result files are submitted to the state;
- Record name of reference laboratory used for confirmatory testing.

Patient Testing

Facility must: Confirm capillary blood lead test results greater than or equal to 4.5 µg/dL with a venous sample sent to an outside reference laboratory. Anything greater than 65 µg/dL should be followed up immediately as an emergency laboratory test. Note: Follow-up is based on the rounded test result. For example, a result of 4.5 µg/dL should be rounded up to 5.

Quality Control

Facility must: Run two levels of Quality Control according to the manufacturer's instructions, which are:

- 1. Each new lot of test kits.
- 2. Each new shipment of materials even if it's the same lot previously received.
- 3. Each new operator (i.e. operator who has not performed the test recently).
- 4. Monthly, as a check on continued storage conditions.
- 5. When problems (storage, operator, instrument, or other) are suspected or identified.
- 6. If otherwise required by your laboratory's standard QC procedures.

Result Reporting

Facility must:

- 1. Report results of ALL blood lead tests for children less than six years of age and for individuals whose age is unknown at the time of testing to the NC Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program within five (5) working days after test completion.
- 2. Report using an electronic format approved by the Department.
